#### **Bible Study with Pastor Diane: Teachings of Jesus**

We continue this fall study series with Diane, which focuses on the topics Jesus most spoke about. Each week we also learn a little about the historical and socio-economical realities of Jesus' time. Anyone can join us anytime! Below is a copy of one of our handouts in class.

#### Jesus teaches about the Kingdom of God

The church has often understood the Beatitudes (Matt. 5:1–16) as Jesus **turning the world's value system upside down**. Where society prizes wealth, power, and influence, Jesus names the poor in spirit, the meek, and those who mourn as "blessed."

A few main ways the church has interpreted this surprising wording:

- **Reversal of values:** The Beatitudes reveal God's kingdom as a great reversal—those overlooked or dismissed by the world are honored by God.
- Encouragement to the faithful: They comfort struggling believers, assuring them that God's blessing rests on their difficult circumstances.
- Call to discipleship: They are not only descriptions but invitations—Christ's followers are called to embody humility, mercy, and peacemaking.

So rather than being sentimental sayings, the church often reads the beatitudes as both **comfort and challenge**: God is present with the lowly, and disciples are to live by these surprising kingdom values.



Key Aspects of the Book

#### Personal Values and Wishes:

It guides readers through the process of creating essential documents, such as legal, financial, and medical forms, and understanding the continuum of care.

The book explores options for culturally and spiritually sensitive end-of-life rituals and celebrations.

"White Book" Concept: Boatwright introduces the idea of a "white book," a binder or digital file containing all necessary information for family members to avoid a "treasure hunt" after a death.


